What can friends and family do to support those with IBS? Supportive relationships are very important. It also important not to blame the person for their symptoms. Those with IBS may be embarrassed by their illness. Having supportive friends and family give the patient the emotional support they need to deal with stress and their conditions. Making the illness the primary focus of the person's life does not help, but continued support does help. Having a good doctor, supportive friends and fam-

> ily, and knowing as much as possible about IBS all help patients cope. Pharmacy technicians can remind patients of these facts and help others deal with this often bothersome condition.
